

A local dairy cattle farm added 100 cows to their herd, but they do not have enough land to grow the feed they need. How can you help?

Your farm is in Eastern Kentucky, where there are several communities known as “food deserts.” About 10 acres of your farm are flat. The rest is primarily hills, some steep.

Your farm is within 25 miles of Louisville, and several subdivisions are nearby. It is a mix of hills and flat areas.

Your best friend just opened a restaurant and wants to source local produce and meats all year. Your farm is a mix of flat and gently rolling hills.

You inherited this central Kentucky farm from your grandparents, but you would like to remain in your Florida home. You are not interested in selling the land. A stream runs through the middle of your farm. On one side, the land is relatively flat. The other side has rolling hills.

Your farm is in Western Kentucky. Within 25 miles is a poultry processing plant. Within 50 miles are an ethanol plant and a flour mill. Your land is flat.

Your farm is in Owensboro, and one side is on the Ohio River. It may flood your land once every 4 to 6 years. The land is very flat.

Your farm is in Calloway County, about 20 miles from Murray. Your closest neighbor lives 2 miles away. Your land is flat.

Your farm is in Woodford County near several large Thoroughbred horse farms that allow visitors. The land has gently rolling hills.

The Simpson County farm you inherited used to raise tobacco, hay, and about 25 head of beef cattle. You are close to Bowling Green, and Nashville is 50 miles away.
